Range: Mexico and Guatemala



Conservation Concern: The Horned Guan is listed as Endangered by the IUCN. The current wild population is estimated to be between 1,000 and 2,500 individuals. Habitat destruction and fragmentation as well as habitat modification due to global warming are the greatest threats to its survival.

Species Account: The Horned Guan is the only species in the genus *Oreophasis*. Once extremely rare in captivity and historically only held and propagated in the collection of Dr. Jesus Estudillo-Lopez in his famous collection in Mexico City. The dedication of Africam Safari has increased the knowledge of the husbandry of this species, increased reproduction, and established an international population of this challenging species.

The Horned Guan, compared to the other Cracid programs, is a relatively new program. This species was only imported into AZA collections in the U.S. within the 2000s. Currently two U.S. institutions house and have bred the Horned Guan (Dallas World Aquarium and the St. Louis Zoo). The majority of the captive population is housed at Africam Safari (>50%) and they occasionally have birds that are available for export. This is an Endangered species that ranges into Mexico and the TAG fully supports the amazing work that Africam Safari is doing and the acquisition of this species by AZA institutions in the U.S.

AZA Role: This cloud forest dependent endangered species in the future will have increasing conservation pressure due to climate change. Although a sensitive subject in some portions of the U.S., those interested in housing this species could use it as an interpretative to illustrate that climate change is not just an issue for arctic animals. Please contact Mike and Anne for further information on how to acquire this species and other husbandry related information.

TAG Monitored Goals: Formerly recommended as SSP in the 2012 RCP, this species was never able to acquire a program manager. As this species is managed by an International Studbook, it was decided that AZA management was not warranted or required at this time.
