Conservation Concern: The Bornean Crested Fireback is listed by the IUCN as near threatened. The escalating concern for all the wildlife on Borneo is habitat conversion for palm oil agriculture. Not only does this practice turn large areas of forest into a monoculture, the fires associated with the clearing of the land can burn for years due to the high amount of peat in the soil.

Species account: The Bornean Crested Fireback was once considered three subspecies until the most recent taxonomic evaluation of this group which re-described the Malayan Crested Fireback, the mainland subspecies, into its own species *Lophura rufa*. Currently, the Bornean Crested Fireback has two subspecies: Greater Bornean Crested Fireback *Lophura i. nobilis* and the Lesser Bornean Crested Fireback *Lophura i. ignita*. The relation and differences between these two subspecies on Borneo is not well-defined. There is a hybrid zone that occurs naturally in the wild on the island, and this population shares a combination of the defining characteristics of these two subspecies.

The captive individuals that make up the AZA population and the U.S. private sector population are of unknown sub-species. Many of the captive birds share the traits of both. Traditionally all birds in AZA have been designated as the Lesser Bornean. Regardless, it is doubtful that new founders will ever be acquired from Borneo and even more doubtful that these animals would have an exact known capture location. Concentration should be placed on the current AZA genetics, the U.S. private sector, and those available from EAZA.

AZA Role: The Bornean Crested Fireback represents a threatened bird species and a biome that is endangered. The effects of palm oil agriculture on this species are of increasing threat, and this species should be highlighted along with the other species of Borneo and Indonesia that are losing habitat to this practice.

TAG Program Goals: This large showy pheasant is a popular bird with the public due to the striking appearance of the male and the bright blue mask of both sexes. These birds are an active exhibit bird, and to ensure the continuation of the unique AZA and private sector genetic lines emphasis needs to be placed on acquiring new spaces for this species. This is still a species that is

bred in the private sector and as recently as the early to mid-1990s Richard Miller was importing wild caught stock.
